

From Precinct to Platform: How Grassroots Republicans Shape the Texas GOP Agenda



The Republican Party of Texas (RPT) operates a multi-tiered, bottom-up system that enables Republicans to contribute directly to the development of the party's official platform and legislative priorities. This process begins at the precinct level and progresses through county or senatorial district conventions to the state convention. The Party Platform serves as a comprehensive statement of principles and policy positions, while legislative priorities highlight a focused set of issues for emphasis during the biennial legislative session. These documents guide party advocacy efforts and provide a mechanism by which voters can hold elected officials accountable.



Precinct Convention

Precinct conventions serve as the entry point for grassroots input in the Republican Party of Texas convention process. They were held immediately after the Republican primary election on March 3rd, 2026.

Any registered voter who participated in the Republican primary or signed an oath affirming affiliation with the party was eligible to attend and participate. The primary activities included electing delegates and alternates to the county or senatorial district (SD) convention and adopting resolutions.

Resolutions are written statements proposing policy positions or changes. They are the initial building blocks for the state platform. Attendees submitted and debated resolutions on a wide range of topics that reflected local concerns. After the conventions concluded, the delegate lists and adopted resolutions were submitted to the county party.



County or Senatorial District Conventions

After precinct convention the county or senatorial districts conventions take place. This year, they will be held on Saturday, March 28th. The convention format depends on geography. Counties that lie entirely within a single state senate district hold a county convention. In counties that are divided between multiple senate districts, separate senatorial district conventions are held for each portion of the county.

The agenda focuses on reviewing and refining resolutions previously submitted at the precinct-level. Committees are formed to guide the process, and delegates debate resolutions, combine similar or redundant items, and vote to advance selected resolutions to the state convention. This consolidation process filters input, ensuring that broadly supported ideas progress. Delegates also elect representatives to the state con-

vention, determining who will carry forward local priorities at the statewide level.



State Convention

The state convention represents the culmination of the process and is scheduled for June 11th - 13th, 2026, at the George R. Brown Convention Center in Houston. Committee meetings, including those related to the platform, begin as early as June 8th.

To engage in the convention activities, individuals must be elected as delegates or alternates through precinct and county/SD conventions. Once seated, delegates may participate in committee assignments, offer testimony, propose floor amendments, and vote. The process adheres to the RPT Rules (available on texasgop.org), which promote orderly proceedings, fair debate, and majority rule. This structured, representative system ensures the platform and legislative priorities reflect input from active Republicans statewide, starting from local precincts and building through successive levels of review and approval.



The Platform

Thousands of delegates from across Texas convene to process the resolutions forwarded from county and SD levels—often numbering in the thousands. These are assigned to the Platform Committee (or relevant permanent standing committees on issues), which consists of delegates selected at low-

er-level conventions.

The Platform Committee conducts detailed review: members examine each resolution, debate wording and implications, propose amendments, and consolidate overlapping proposals into coherent planks. Delegates not on the committee can testify during committee hearings to support, oppose, or suggest modifications to specific language. This stage allows for thorough discussion and refinement.

The committee produces a recommended draft platform, which is reported to the full convention floor. On the floor, delegates review the draft, propose additional amendments, debate provisions, and vote on changes or approval. Final adoption requires a majority vote of the delegates present. Once approved, the document becomes the official Republican Party of Texas Platform, outlining the party's positions on issues ranging from constitutional rights and limited government to education, healthcare, and elections.



Legislative Priorities

Distinct from but informed by the platform, legislative priorities establish a targeted agenda for the upcoming 2027 Texas legislative session. These priorities are typically identified and voted on during the state convention, drawing from the platform's broader principles and the resolutions process. They focus on high-impact issues where the party seeks coordinated action, such as advancing

key reforms or opposing specific policies. Elected officials can use these priorities to guide advocacy and measure accountability, while grassroots Republicans can use them to score legislative success.



Conclusion

Through this structured, bottom-up process, the Republican Party of Texas ensures that

its platform and legislative priorities are not dictated from the top, but built from the voices of engaged voters across the state. From participating in precinct conventions to debating resolutions at county, district, and state levels, grassroots participants play a direct role in defining the party's direction. Ultimately, this system empowers local involvement and connects elected officials to the priorities of the constituents they serve.
